Prescription

This course is designed for those with no knowledge of Japanese. It covers basic oral and written skills including hiragana, katakana and 92 kanji. This course is for absolute beginners. It may not be taken by students with prior knowledge of the language.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. communicate effectively in a variety of practical situations;
- 2. recognise the meaning(s) and reading(s) of hiragana, katana and 92 kanji (reading and writing skills);
- 3. recognise and appropriately apply grammar of modern Japanese (oral, aural, reading and writing skills) at an elementary level;
- 4. gain an introductory understanding of Japanese society and culture through language study on this course (intercultural competence).

Teaching format

Grammatical structures and cultural aspects of the language will be introduced in the lectures and students will practice the four skills of reading, writing, speaking, and listening. In the tutorials, further practice will be given for reading and writing Japanese, and students' oral skills will also be a main focus.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. attend at least 80% of all classes including tutorials;
- 2. submit all assignments and sit all major tests and assessments (10%+).

Workload

The University anticipates that you should be able to devote about 200 hours to a 20-point course including class contact time, background reading, research, and work on assessments (roughly 13 hours per week). **Please note that this is a rough guideline only.** Some students will find they need to do more, and students aiming for high grades will almost certainly need to do more.—i.e. in the case of JAPA 111, 12 hours of private study outside class time.

- a) Students are expected to attend 5 hours of tuition per week.
- b) Students must submit all assignments; sit all tests (10%+), and take part in an oral presentation in lectures.
- c) If a student's progress is not satisfactory despite spending a large amount of time on study, the Course Coordinator should be consulted. Students should feel free to consult the Course Coordinator at any time with any queries.

Assessment

This course is internally assessed. Assessment covers all four skills of reading, writing, listening and speaking. Tests are given throughout the course to enable the lecturer and students to monitor progress in language acquisition.

Individual times and guidelines for the oral presentations will be advised later. Oral presentations will be completed in groups of two (or more) but they will be individually assessed. You will have time to prepare in advance.

Grading Procedures: In determining the grades for each course, the Japanese Programme uses the University's standard marking scheme.

Submission and return of work

All tests will be submitted during lectures or tutorials. Every effort will be made to return work during contact hours in a timely fashion. Any unclaimed items of assessment and final test papers will be available for collection at the SLC office at the end of trimester.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Extensions may be given in certain circumstances. Students must apply for an extension by contacting the course coordinator before the due date of a piece of assessment.

Penalties

- a) If a student is unable to sit a quiz or a test due to illness or other extraordinary circumstances the course coordinator must be contacted. Evidence such as a medical certificate must be provided as soon as possible in order to avoid a penalty.
