Students are ranked on their academic performance in their first year of the BAS and the BBSc. Candidates with previous degrees, qualifications in related disciplines or with prior tertiary study and extensive professional experience will also be considered for entry into the second year of these degrees.

BDI second year

Students are ranked on their academic performance in their first year of the BDI. Candidates with previous qualifications in related disciplines or with prior tertiary study and extensive professional experience will also be considered for entry to the second year of the BDI.

Appeals against Selection Committee decisions

The selection of students into the second years of the BAS, BBSc and BDI is made by a Selection Committee for each degree appointed by the Head of School. Appeals against the decisions of the Selection Committees should be directed in the first instance to the relevant Head of School.

Faculty equity policy

The principal criterion for selection is academic merit. Where a choice has to be made between students who have equivalent academic records, preference is given to students from groups that are under-represented in their cohort.

Limited-entry courses

Selection for MARK 313 will be made on the basis of academic merit, with early admission as long as spaces remain for students with a B grade or better in MARK 202 and 211. Admission to courses with capacity limits will be on a first-come, first-served basis.

Honours and Master's programmes

Students will be selected on the basis of academic merit.

Appeals against exclusion

Exclusion from individual BCA courses should be discussed with the relevant Head of School. Appeals against any of these decisions should go to the Associate Dean (Students).

Students should ensure that their Enrolment Application is submitted as early as possible (preferably by 10 December 2011) to have the best chance of gaining a place in the courses and streams of their choice.

Major requirements

All BCA students must satisfy the requirements of at least one major subject as listed below and may also add a BA or BSc major. Consult the prescriptions section of this publication to find prerequisites for courses. No 300-level course may be counted toward more than one major subject. Consult the relevant Head of School for details on possible substitutes.

Minor requirements

BCA students may obtain a minor in up to two undergraduate subject areas not taken as major subjects by including in their course of study:

- (a) in the case of BA or BSc subject areas*, at least 60 points from the corresponding major requirements at 200 level or above
- (b) in the case of commerce subjects, at least 60 points at 200 level or above with the relevant subject code.

In either case, at least 15 of the 60 points must be at 300 level, and no 300-level courses may be counted towards two minors or towards a major and a minor.

Planning a first-year programme

Full-time students should enrol in courses that total around 120 points a year. You should include all three core 100-level Tourism courses in your first-year programme, as well as (normally) three commerce electives, taking into consideration which 200-level commerce electives you'd like to do in your second year. Students who wish to include a language or other (approved) subject area in their BTM should also look at starting this in the first year.

Applying for teacher education programmes

- ☑ Entrance to Victoria does not guarantee acceptance into teacher education programmes. Admission to teacher education programmes will only be granted after entry criteria have been satisfied—see below.

Admission to teacher education programmes

Admission to teacher education programmes involves meeting set academic criteria, having supportive referees, making declarations about criminal convictions or health and disability issues and successfully taking part in a group exercise to assess interpersonal skills.

The assessment exercise includes thinking about the qualities needed to be a good teacher and a follow-up discussion with a group of other applicants. The assessment evaluates your skills in listening, oral communication and working with others and is useful for determining your suitability for teaching. The New Zealand Teachers Council also requires that your literacy and numeracy skills are tested before you begin your programme. When you attend the assessment exercise you will be asked to complete a form giving the University permission to seek a police check. This is required for all students who will spend time in schools or centres as part of their study.

This assessment must be undertaken before full acceptance to a teacher education programme. Students applying for the early childhood, primary or secondary graduate diplomas must be able to attend an assessment exercise before mid-December 2011.

If English is not your first language you should undertake an IELTS test and submit the test results with your application. Admission to teacher education programmes requires a minimum IELTS test score of 7.0 in each of the four categories assessed.

Distance/online delivery

Some of the Faculty's programmes and courses are offered by online delivery, designed for people who want to learn at their own convenience, in their own community.

Online distance learning allows study using a mix of online technologies and paper-based material. Students in the online early childhood, primary or secondary graduate diploma programmes attend a compulsory residency course in Wellington in February 2012 as part of their programme.

Online delivery is available through Victoria's e-learning system, which operates using the Blackboard platform. In order to take advantage of the full range of content available on this platform, it is advised that you have a Broadband connection. The quality of your learning is enhanced by regular contact, support and guidance from your lecturers. This may suit those who live in a remote location or are unable to come to Wellington to undertake the campus-based equivalents. Computer Science

COMP 102 Introduction to Computer Program Design

This assumes basic computer skills. It does not assume any experience with computer programming, although such experience will be helpful. COMP 102 is offered in the first and second trimesters.

COMP 103 Introduction to Data Structures and Algorithms

You need to pass COMP 102 before COMP 103. COMP 103 is offered in the first and second trimesters.

Mathematics

MATH 132 Introduction to Mathematical Thinking

For students with little or no mathematics background. It will be offered in Trimester Three of 2011 and Trimester One of 2012. This course will provide entry to MATH 141, 151 and 161.

MATH 141 Calculus 1A

You need at least 16 NCEA Level 3 Mathematics credits or MATH 132. MATH 141 is offered in Trimester One.

MATH 142 Calculus 1B

You need at least 18 credits from NCEA Level 3 Mathematics with Calculus or MATH 141. MATH 142 is offered in Trimester Two.

MATH 151 Algebra

You need at least 16 credits from NCEA Level 3 Mathematics or MATH 132. MATH 151 is offered in Trimester One.

MATH 161 Discrete Mathematics and Logic

You need at least 16 credits from NCEA Level 3 Mathematics or MATH 132. MATH 161 is offered in Trimester Two.

MATH 177 Probability and Decision Modelling

You need 16 credits from NCEA Level 3 Mathematics, including 12 credits in Calculus or MATH 132. MATH 177 is offered in Trimester Two.

Physics

PHYS 131 Energy and the Environment

PHYS 131 is offered in Trimester One for students who do not meet the PHYS 114/115 entry requirements.

PHYS 122 Introduction to Physics and Applied Physics

PHYS 122 is offered in Trimester Two for students who do not meet the PHYS 114/115 entry requirements.

PHYS 114 Physics 1A

You should have physics to NCEA Level 3, and have achieved at least 14 credits in achievement standards at this level or PHYS 131 or 122 AND at least 14 credits of NCEA Level 3 Mathematics (Calculus) or MATH 141, or equivalent backgrounds in physics and calculus. Students with fewer than 14 credits of NCEA Level 3 Physics will be required to take PHYS 131 in the first trimester. Those with fewer than 14 credits of NCEA Level 3 Calculus will be required to do MATH 141. PHYS 114 is offered in Trimester One.

Note: Students who are very well prepared and achieve exceptional results at NCEA Level 3 or Scholarship level may be exempted from PHYS 114 and offered direct entry to the 200-level course PHYS 221. If you are interested in exploring this option you should contact the School of Chemical and Physical Sciences as soon as NCEA results become available.

PHYS 115 Physics 1B

You need PHYS 114 or a B+ pass in PHYS 131 AND at least 14 credits of NCEA Level 3 Mathematics (Calculus) or MATH 141, or equivalent backgrounds in physics and calculus. PHYS 115 is offered in Trimester Two.

Statistics

STAT 193 Statistics for Natural and Social Sciences*

If you don't have at least NCEA Level 2 Mathematics you may need to take a bridging course through the University's Student Learning Support Service before enrolling.

First year

The first year consists of three LAWS courses, together with at least 70 points in non-LAWS courses of your choice. LAWS 121, which is offered in the first trimester, is open entry, subject to university admission criteria. A pass in LAWS 121 is a prerequisite for both LAWS 122 and 123.

Two streams of LAWS 121, 122 and 123 are held at the Kelburn Campus, and another stream in each course is held at the Pipitea Campus. Check your timetable carefully before selecting a stream. If a stream is full you will be assigned to another stream, so get your application in early to avoid disappointment. If all streams are full you may be waitlisted.

Prerequisites for entry to second-year Law

Applicants for second-year Law must have passed:

- ☒ LAWS 121, 122 and 123 at Victoria, or their equivalents at another New Zealand or Australian university, and
- ☒ at least 70 other non-LAWS points by 10 December.

Note: All transferring students must have 120 points including 100-level Law to be eligible for selection.

200-level selection criteria

The following criteria apply to courses LAWS 211, 212, 213 and 214.

There are 300 places available in each 200-level LAWS course.

Priority of entry is given to returning 200-level LAWS students who satisfy the criteria at Category 1 below, followed by first-time applicants who satisfy the criteria at Category 2 below.

Category 1

Returning 200-level LAWS students who have passed more than 50 percent of all previous 200-level LAWS courses (at Victoria or any other New Zealand university) in respect of which they have received a grade (ie. a passing grade or failing grade)

Note:

- ☒ More than 50 percent of all previous 200-level LAWS courses means one out of one, two out of two, two out of three or three out of four.
- ☒ '200-level LAWS course' means LAWS 211, 212, 213 and 214. It does not include LAWS 297 or its predecessors LAWS 298 and 299.

Category 2

First-time applicants (ie. LLB students who have not previously enrolled in a 200-level LAWS course, but who have completed their 100-level LAWS courses) who:

- ☒ have a B+ grade point average (or better) over LAWS 121, 122 and 123, and
- ☒ have passed at least 70 non-LAWS points.

Transferring students must have 120 points, including the equivalent of LAWS 121, 122 and 123.

If there are more applicants in Category 2 than there are places available, students in Category 2 will be ranked and selected according to their LAWS grade point average. When calculating the grade point average for Category 2 applicants, the student's highest LAWS passing grades are taken into account; previous lower passing grades, and any failing grades, are not taken into account.

If there is a need to determine cut-off points (ie. between accepted, waitlisted and declined applicants), specific marks in 100-level LAWS courses may be taken into account.

Category 3

If there is space remaining after Categories 1 and 2 above have been considered, that remaining space will be filled by ranking all other applicants by grade point average in the LAWS courses and selecting according to that ranking.

To determine cut-off points (ie. between accepted, waitlisted and declined applicants), specific marks in 100-level LAWS courses may be taken into account.

The ranking process for Category 3 will be undertaken on the following basis:

1. Returning 200-level LAWS students will be ranked on the basis of all of their LAWS grades, ie. 100- and 200-level LAWS courses (but not LAWS 297).
2. First-time applicants will be considered on the basis of their 100-level LAWS grades.

Note:

- ☒ First-time applicants must have completed at least 70 non-LAWS points, or have an exemption from that requirement.
- ☒ In calculating the grade point average for Category 3, only the best 100-level LAWS passing grades are taken into account (ie. 100-level LAWS failing grades are not taken into account), but all 200-level LAWS grades*, including 200-level LAWS failing grades, are taken into account. (*That is, all grades for LAWS 211, 212, 213 and 214. LAWS 297, 298 or 299 grades are not included in this calculation.)

Māori Admissions Process

A supplementary admission process is also run to assess tangata whenua students for entry into second-year LAWS courses if they would not otherwise be considered. Ten percent of available places in each second-year LAWS course are reserved for Māori students applying under the Māori Admissions Process. Students who wish to be considered under this process should indicate this when asked as part of their enrolment application.

Transferring students

All applicants applying for 200-level LAWS courses must have completed a minimum of 120 points including 100-level Law.

To complete the LLB at Victoria, transferring students from other New Zealand universities must complete a minimum of 160 Victoria points. An overall total of 480 points is required for the LLB.

Graduates

Unless they have completed first-year Law elsewhere, graduates are expected to complete first-year Law at Victoria, and may be permitted to do so concurrently with second-year LAWS courses. If that permission is granted graduates may enrol concurrently in 100- and 200-level LAWS once only. To be considered for graduate enrolment students must have achieved a B+ average over their most recent 90 non-LAWS points or their equivalent. The policy regarding graduate entry to the LLB may be seen on the Law website at www.victoria.ac.nz/law

Exceptional circumstances

Although the above criteria will be the primary basis for admission to second-year Law, students who have passed the prerequisite courses but failed to otherwise satisfy the entry criteria may seek selection into second-year courses on the basis of exceptional circumstances. These are circumstances that make the application of the above criteria inappropriate to them and that justify ranking them ahead of applicants who have stronger qualifications for admission in terms of this policy.

The documentation of exceptional circumstances must be made on the Faculty's form in writing and be submitted by 10 December 2011; late applications cannot be considered.

These applications will be considered on a case-by-case basis by a panel of Faculty members, chaired by the Deputy Dean according to criteria agreed by the Faculty.

Other selection considerations

Applicants with international or non-standard qualifications are subject to the preceding criteria. Contact the Law Faculty Student Administration Office for advice.

Appeals against exclusion from limited-entry courses

These should be made, in writing, to the Student Administration Manager of the Law Faculty.

200-level streams

Choose your stream carefully as you may not be permitted to change stream mid-year. A course/stream preference form is included as part of the 2012 online enrolment process.

LAWS 301 and 312

All students must complete LAWS 301 Property Law and LAWS 312 Equity, Trusts and Succession in their third year, or fourth year if studying for a double or conjoint degree.

300-level electives

Applications for capped LAWS electives must be received by the limited-entry deadline, 10 December 2011, in order to be included in the ballot for any oversubscribed course. If a course is oversubscribed at that date, priority is given to those completing their degree by the end of the second trimester and a ballot is held for the remaining places. If the number of applications at 10 December does not exceed the cap, applications will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis, subject to selection criteria and prerequisites.

To enrol in a 300-level elective in the first or second trimester you must have either passed LAWS 301 and LAWS 312 or be enrolled in them.

Summer trimester courses

Students who have met the criteria should enrol in summer electives by 10 December 2011. Students completing in the summer will be given priority if courses are oversubscribed at that date.

Chemistry

CHEM 113 Concepts of Chemistry

Although CHEM 113 is an open-entry course that provides entry into CHEM 114, we strongly advise that candidates who have not studied chemistry to NCEA Level 2 complete CHEM 191 before enrolling in CHEM 113 which is offered in Trimester One.

CHEM 114 Principles of Chemistry

You need at least 14 NCEA Level 3 Chemistry credits or a pass in CHEM 113. It is offered in the first and second trimesters.

CHEM 115 Structure and Spectroscopy

You need a pass in CHEM 114 or an A- or better in CHEM 113 while being concurrently enrolled in CHEM 114. It is offered in Trimester Two.

Computer Science

COMP 102 Introduction to Computer Program Design

This assumes basic computer skills. It does not assume any experience with computer programming, although such experience will be helpful. COMP 102 is offered in the first and second trimesters.

COMP 103 Introduction to Data Structures and Algorithms

You need to pass COMP 102 before COMP 103. COMP 103 is offered in the first and second trimesters.

Mathematics

MATH 132 Introduction to Mathematical Thinking

For students with little or no mathematics background. This course will provide entry to MATH 141, 151 and 161. It will be offered in Trimester Three of 2011 and Trimester One of 2012.

MATH 141 Calculus 1A

You need at least 16 NCEA Level 3 Mathematics credits or MATH 132. MATH 141 is offered in Trimester One.

MATH 142 Calculus 1B

You need at least 18 credits from NCEA Level 3 Mathematics with Calculus or MATH 141. MATH 142 is offered in Trimester Two.

MATH 151 Algebra

You need at least 16 credits from NCEA Level 3 Mathematics or MATH 132. MATH 151 is offered in Trimester One.

MATH 161 Discrete Mathematics and Logic

You need at least 16 credits from NCEA Level 3 Mathematics or MATH 132. MATH 161 is offered in Trimester Two.

MATH 177 Probability and Decision Modelling

You need 16 credits from NCEA Level 3 Mathematics, including 12 credits in Calculus or MATH 132. MATH 177 is offered in Trimester Two.

Physics

PHYS 131 Energy and Environmental Physics

PHYS 131 is offered in Trimester One for students who do not meet the PHYS 114/115 entry requirements.

PHYS 122 Introduction to Physics and Applied Physics

PHYS 122 will be offered in Trimester Two for students who do not meet the PHYS 114/115 entry requirements.

PHYS 114 Physics 1A

You should have physics to NCEA Level 3, and have achieved at least 14 credits in achievement standards at this level or PHYS 131 or 122 AND at least 14 credits of NCEA Level 3 Mathematics (Calculus) or MATH 141, or equivalent backgrounds in physics and calculus. Students with fewer than 14 credits of NCEA Level 3 Physics will be required to take PHYS 131 in the first trimester. Those with fewer than 14 credits of NCEA Level 3 Calculus will be required to do MATH 141. Offered in Trimester One.

Note: Students who are very well prepared and achieve exceptional results at NCEA Level 3 or Scholarship level may be exempted from PHYS 114 and offered direct entry to the 200-level course PHYS 221. If you are interested in exploring this option you should contact the School of Chemical and Physical Sciences as soon as NCEA results become available.

PHYS 115 Physics 1B

You need PHYS 114 or a B+ pass in PHYS 131 AND at least 14 credits of NCEA Level 3 Mathematics (Calculus) or MATH 141, or equivalent backgrounds in physics and calculus. It is offered in Trimester Two.

Statistics

STAT 193 Statistics for Natural and Social Sciences*

If you don't have at least NCEA Level 2 Mathematics you may need to take a bridging course through the University's Student Learning Support Service before enrolling.

*QUAN 102 is considered equivalent to STAT 193.

Biological Sciences, Geography, Geology and Psychology

100-level courses do not assume any previous knowledge in these subjects, although NCEA Level 2 Biology is strongly recommended for Biology and Biomedical Science courses.

Second-year Psychology

To be guaranteed entry to the core 200-level Psychology course (PSYC 232), students must pass a 100-level STAT course and achieve a B grade in at least one 100-level PSYC course.

Second-year surveying at Otago

The following courses are required for entry to second-year surveying at Otago: INFO 101, MATH 141, 142, 151, 161, STAT 193, WRIT 101, and one further elective course; plus SURV 111 by distance from Otago.

Certificate in Foundation Studies (CFnDS)

About the Certificate

The Foundation Studies programme is an intensive eight-month programme specifically for international students (students studying in New Zealand on a Student Visa). It is designed to give international students the academic skills and English language practice needed to gain entry to university and succeed in degree-level study. It involves 25 contact hours per week over two trimesters. Entry to the programme is available in February, July or November each year. Successful completion of the Foundation Studies programme qualifies students for admission to degree-level study at Victoria.

Certificate requirements

Total points required: 120

- ▣ The programme comprises six courses
- ▣ In the first trimester of study, FNDN 001 is compulsory and two elective courses are chosen from FNDN, 003, 004, 005, 006, 025
- ▣ In the second trimester of study FNDN 011 is compulsory and two elective courses are chosen from FNDN 003 to 029
- ▣ The programme must include one of FNDN 004, 005, 025

Admission

To be accepted, international students will need to:*

- a. have an English Language proficiency equivalent to an IELTS band score of 5.5 (with no subscore below 5.0) or a TOEFL score of 525 (195 in the computer-based test)
- b. be at least 17 years old and have completed secondary school to the set entrance standards
- c. have produced evidence that they are suitably qualified and will benefit from enrolling in the programme
- d. have been accepted for the programme by Victoria International.

Certificate of Proficiency in English (CertEnglProf)

The Certificate of Proficiency in English (EPP) is a programme of intensive language courses for students with an intermediate or advanced knowledge of English. This programme helps you to improve in: reading and listening to complex information; taking an active part in discussions; and expressing complex ideas and facts through speech and writing.

At the end of the course, you will receive a final written report on your English proficiency. This includes a proficiency rating indicating the level of English you have achieved. With a minimum of three ratings of '4' and one rating of '3' on the English Language Institute's English Proficiency Scale for speaking, listening, reading and writing, you will be awarded a Certificate of English Proficiency. The Certificate is accepted by most universities in New Zealand as an alternative to IELTS and TOEFL for admission to undergraduate degree programmes.

The English Proficiency Programme courses are 12 weeks long and are offered in March, July and November each year. The programme is full-time and consists of 20 to 25 hours per week of class work, as well as your own independent study. A non-certificate programme, English for Professional Purposes: Workplace Communication for Skilled Migrants, is a 12-week course to help unemployed skilled migrants with tertiary qualifications to improve communication skills in the workplace. Migrants must have good English language proficiency (minimum IELTS 6.0) and have work experience in their profession. The course has a six-week work placement component and a six-week classroom component.

Foundation Certificate in Jazz (CJazz)

The Foundation Certificate in Jazz, offered by the NZSM, is an 18-week full-time intensive programme for students preparing for entry to the BMusic in Jazz Performance. It does not provide University Entrance. See the NZSM website www.nzsm.ac.nz for further details.

Tohu Māoritanga/Diploma in Māoritanga (Tohu Māori/DipMāori)

The Tohu Māoritanga/Diploma in Māoritanga is designed to provide students with a foundation in Māori language; Māori culture and society; Māori customs and practice; and academic study skills. A University Entrance qualification is not required. The Tohu Māoritanga supports the development of the academic skills needed for tertiary study. The Tohu Māoritanga can be completed in one full year of academic study (February–November). When completed, students may be permitted to cross-credit up to 80 points towards a BA degree at Victoria.

Tohu Māoritanga requirements

Minimum points required: 125

- a. MAOR 804*; at least two of MAOR 801–803
- b. MAOR 101 and 102 or MAOR 111 and 112 or MAOR 121; at least two of MAOR 122–124, 212–214, 216

*The Head of School may exempt from MAOR 804 a candidate with the required study skills.
