

## "Unearthing New Zealand's Constitutional Traditions"

T IS OFTEN SAID that New Zealand's dominant constitutional tradition is pragmatism—the "number eight wire" approach to constitutional change. But this hides other, and often richer, narratives from our constitutional past. This conference seeks to take a deeper look at, and to shed more light on, the fundamental ideals on which our constitution is based. It will carry on the Centre for Public Law's own tradition of inquiry into our constitution by bringing together a number of distinguished scholars from New Zealand and abroad to reflect on these important questions and to begin unearthing the country's traditions of constitutional thought.
